Dear Parents,

There's definitely a more autumnal feel to the air this week. We have had a lot of rain over the week. Just a reminder when our field is wet, it is very wet! Please make sure your child has wellies and/or spare trainers and socks in school so that they can continue to enjoy the field and woods. Many children this week have discovered that their wellies are too small for them or are very wet. 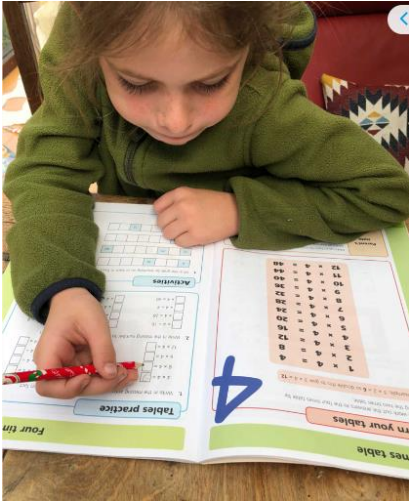

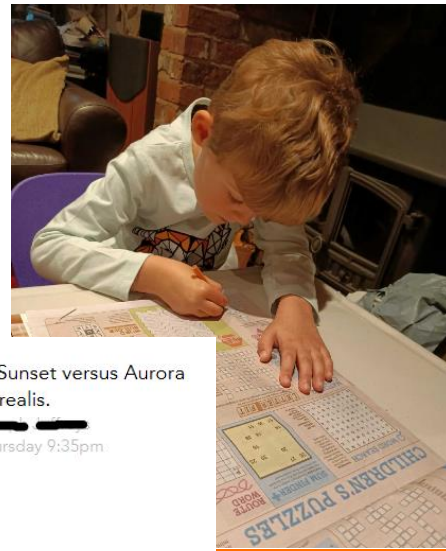
